


## Minister's Letter

Dear Friends

It is easy to come to church, to find some enthusiasm, to become caught up in the story of Jesus as we come to the Christmas period. However in reality most of it is Advent and Christmas does not start until 25<sup>th</sup> December. Hence some will say that we don't sing sufficient of the 'Christmas' carols *before* Christmas. Now you know why! There is a story to tell that is associated with, but which certainly is not, Christmas.

I want to suggest that as we grow and develop we hold a continued dialogue within ourselves, in multifarious voices, not as a meaningless babble, but as a way of keeping ourselves true, honest and moving forward. If we truly engage with that process then we don't just revisit that old story and find warmth and comfort. What it must do is change us – every visit – so that we leave as different people. We'll still find the basic story, we'll still find a constant God who loves us, but this real renewed relationship will actually feel tangible and alive!



Most of life, and most of the time we are in church is *ordinary* time. If we are sufficiently aware then even this ordinariness can be revealing, if not demanding in attention, interpretation, and response. I came across a rather depressing description of this in an essay earlier in the year. The author involved, whom I have not read directly, Schopenhauer, was born in 18<sup>th</sup>C Poland. He suggested that the rapidly fleeting present is all there is; everything else (what we casually refer to as past or future) is merely a fanciful play of thought. And our failure truly to know past

or future, said Schopenhauer, robs the present of significance, robs us of the ability even to have a present: “At every moment, all things become as nothing and thereby lose their true value.”<sup>1</sup> But we know the seasons come and go and have light, colour, contrast and meaning. The major festival days have colours, they are - Christmas, Epiphany, Easter, All Saints, Transfiguration – the colour white (it can be argued that the colour should be gold!) Trinity could fall into the same category, but we would usually designate it by the colour red; Advent and Lent are purple for penitence, and all other Sundays are ‘green’ for *ordinary* time. That time used to be known as Pentecost. So the Sundays were numbered from Pentecost Sunday on until Christ the King, before Advent Sunday. (Some would have what we call the season of Epiphany also called ordinary time. However I think keeping Epiphany helps us concentrate on the significant markers in Jesus life as we move from Christmas towards Lent.)

Back to that essay which goes on to pick up suggestions from other authors showing how ‘we’ keep time now only goes to empty the future of meaning. Our task must be



to authentically keep the now, read it, hear it, understand it, and transmit it onward, for our own sakes and for others, not just with meaning, but with joyous infectious enthusiasm that draws the world into God’s time – all of it, even the *ordinary*! Then perhaps the idea of hope making future

things real in our present context will give the enthusiasm for periods like Advent. Also we will be getting somewhere towards our goal of seeing more than just the same old story. You may, if I wait long enough, even be driven to exclaim, ‘Alleluia!’ when Christmas does arrive because we’ve not rubbed the shine off already!





## CHURCH NEWS

### Church Meeting Report :

Two church meetings have been held since the last edition of the newsletter.

**Newsletter** We accepted with sincere thanks Alison Dawson's offer to produce the newsletter. We agreed that from October the Newsletter would be bi-monthly and that we would gather email addresses so where people are willing, they can receive the newsletter by email. Holymoorside has confirmed their agreement to this decision. We also agreed to a retiring collection for a gift for Lesley Caddy to thank her for her work as Newsletter Editor. The Treasurer reported that £41 had been collected and will send her a cheque for £50.

**Premises** At both meetings we discussed repairs to the manse and redecoration of the church. We agreed that following the water leak in the manse kitchen we would completely refit the kitchen and replace the old boiler. We have been offered £3540 by the insurance company and a grant of £2560 by Synod towards the cost. The work should go ahead in early December. In September we approved expenditure of £1550-1600 for the external redecoration of the premises and up to £1300 to complete the redecoration of the sanctuary and vestibule. In November we approved expenditure of up to £1200 + VAT to replace the vestry window and the fire door next to the vestry. Much of this work will not take place until spring 2014, giving time to gather the money needed.



**Finance** The Treasurer reported that the bank balance in the first week of November was £13,592. But with some heavy expenditure on the premises planned he is looking forward to the expected boost from the Christmas Bazaar! We agreed at the September meeting to distribute letters to everyone encouraging giving to the church and including a leaflet on proportionate giving produced by the URC. These went out in October and we look forward to your response.

**Ecumenical** We heard the plans from Churches Together in Newbold for next year. The Week of Prayer Service will be at St Hugh's at 6.00pm on Sunday January 19<sup>th</sup>

and our own minister will be the preacher. There will be an event on Tuesday June 3<sup>rd</sup>, details to follow.

We agreed to give our Food Bank collections during November and occasional months in 2014 to the Salvation Army for their Food Bank in Newbold.



**Lent** We agreed to run the York course during Lent 2014. Details of days and times will be in the February/March Newsletter.

**The next Church Meeting** will be on Sunday 2<sup>nd</sup> February immediately after worship. Everyone is welcome and encouraged to come.

### **Commitment for Life**

Linda Mead, the Commitment for Life Coordinator, wrote to thank us for the warm welcome we gave her and her husband when she came to lead worship on 20<sup>th</sup> October. It was encouraging to receive news from her of the work in our partner country, Zimbabwe. Our donations this year were £645. Because of the new rules, nearly all of this can be gift aided which will increase the amount of the Gift Aid rebate next year.



There is to be a change in the Commitment for Life partners next year. Zimbabwe, Bangladesh and Israel and the Occupied Territories remain partners and their programmes and projects will continue to receive funding from Commitment for Life through Christian Aid. Jamaica is leaving the programme and in its place is Central America, which includes Nicaragua, El Salvador, Honduras and Guatemala.

Christian Aid has been supporting partners in Central America for many years and this will allow them to increase their work there with URC support.





## **Synod Report**

The post of Youth and Children's Work Developer is to be advertised in December. Youth and Children's Work hubs will coordinate geographical areas so that churches can ask questions, share resources and contact the advocate of their hub for help. Finance and Property.

Ministry and Mission Fund (M&M): We were told that 9.15% is given back to the Synod. 85% of M&M goes to ministers' stipends, some goes to the administration, youth work, Pilots, overseas mission and training new ministers. A new report on a giving survey is to be sent to the churches. Amongst other things it has been found that the least well off give proportionately more than the wealthiest and that the offering people give each week rises in proportion to the involvement in church life, e.g. elders give more than members.

Synod hopes to get £30,000 in 2014 from resource sharing i.e. richer synods helping poorer ones. If not, next year's budget will have to be changed. Although there is a half-year deficit, a small surplus is likely by the end of 2013.

Churches were asked to help defray the cost of next year's General Assembly, which is now held every 2 years, by sending a donation. Church House is allowing £50 per person for meals and accommodation, the rest will be met by Synod which is sending 16 representatives, though 3 young people will be paid for by Church House.

Martin Gage gave a talk about making a will. Every November solicitors will not charge for making a will if you agree to give a donation to 1 of 9 charities. £13.6 million has been raised since 1988. If people in your church are interested in leaving something in their will to charity, he will come and talk to the church.

**Property Report :** Tideswell are still waiting for the auction of the Church and school room. Rose Hill has not yet completed the proposed lease to Chesterfield Studios. The church has been given permission to undertake internal alterations. Wirksworth are having a new roof on their church.

**Mission Development :** We have been asked to contact a mission enabler to report on Back to Church Sunday. Vision 2020 is a framework to support planning

for mission. Churches are invited to select 1 or 2 mission priorities and form a Mission Pledge to address these priorities. If we need help the Mission Development Group will help.

Charles Jolly would like to talk to churches involved in food banks.

**Pastoral Report** : As there are now no district councils it is hoped to have either annual or 6 monthly meetings in different areas for fellowship, social and discussion of items of interest to the group.

A successor is needed to Duncan Smith as Synod Clerk. A young person is also needed to represent the views of F.U.R.Y. to synod.

## oots<sup>©</sup> *Bible Study*

*The Bible passage is Numbers 8: 1 - 14*

We are now into the period of Advent. We've had advance notice and are well prepared to face these few weeks of reflection on what Christmas might mean for us this year.

In the reading we found that the Levites were to be prepared for their office of overseeing the worship of Israel and the rituals of the Tent of Meeting. Part of it was to do with light and preparing oneself, the rest about dedication.

As a community we are preparing to welcome the light into the world and then tell the world about the light – the light of God in Christ. We have Jesus' own words for that in John's Gospel 8:12 and 9:5 where he says, 'I am the light of the world.'

It would be strange, and Jesus thought so too, if people who have light hide it away so that it cannot be seen. (Matt 5: 14-16) We should be actively looking for ways to make the light known, understood, available as a force for good in the world.



It was at the birth of Jesus, what we call Christmas, that the angel choirs appear to shepherds in the Judean hills and lit up the sky with their numbers and musical message. (Luke 2:8-20) It was later still that the wise men arrive from outside the country to offer stupendous gifts of great wealth to the new-born baby Jesus. (Matt 2:1-12)

They were significant for the future child – portents of his life and meaning for us who follow after him. They are illuminations of all that is to follow – the gold of kingship, the frankincense representing Jesus' priestly role, and the myrrh of

suffering. At this point we are confronted by the local religious community in Jerusalem who didn't travel the few miles to Bethlehem. Yet these Wise men, who came 'from a far country', saw what they believed to be a sign and followed through.


We need to follow through into the New Year. We need to overcome the boring bits, the tough times, enjoy the exciting and rewarding occasions. We need to be consistent in our commitment; not necessarily being seen on every possible occasion but being known as reliable and there when needed.

So the period of Advent is very important for the days ahead – in fact the year ahead. You will be reading this after the end of the church's year – November 24<sup>th</sup>, the Sunday known as Christ the King; a day that crowns the whole year. On the other hand you will receive it as we commence that journey into a new year, a new relationship with Jesus as you perceive it this year.




